Harvest Thanksgiving

This year the stewards have nominated the Whitechapel Mission for our Harvest Service Appeal.



The Mission, formerly called the Whitechapel Methodist Mission, has been serving the homeless and marginalised since 1876. This year marks the Charity's 150th anniversary.

It provides food, shelter, clothing and medical care in addition to addressing deeper needs for life skills, job skills training and addiction recovery. Their services include:

- Free breakfast weekdays from 8am - 10am
- Free showers weekdays from 6.30am - 10am
- Free clothing when needed
- Advice and support team 8am - 3pm
- Computer suite weekdays 8am - 3pm

As many as 450 people walk through their door every day and in 2025 their success rate was impressive:

- 126,283 meals were served
- 3,258 people were offered housing advice
- 9,391 were given support **resulting in:**
- 367 being prevented from being homeless
- 59 finding employment
- 41 being referred for treatment

About Alana, our new Circuit Minister

I am delighted to be able to introduce myself to the Kingston-upon-Thames Circuit, ever mindful that nothing can replace the richness of encountering each other in person. Who, then is this new minister coming into your community; a wife, step-mum, daughter, sister, sister-in-law, niece, cousin, aunt, grand aunt, friend and colleague. A presbyter, theologian, pilgrim, poet, teacher, barrister, mathematician, bookbinder, printer, bibliophile, and appreciator of art, music, and creation. I hope together these descriptors express a deep relationality, an awareness that all that I am has been formed and continues to be transformed in relationship with God, self, and others.

Many years ago, I took a course at Heythrop College and read there that spirituality was an expression of our relational natures. This made enormous sense to me, striking at the depth of what it is to be...a matter of ultimate concern. Relational wellbeing and spirituality go hand in hand. At the heart of what it is to be fully human, is to be ever formed in relationship, in community with God, self and others, balancing our needs with those of others, with God and with all creation, nurturing, sustaining and building up, that we may become members of communities of relational transformation. This is after all what it is to be Christians, to live out our call to love one another as we love ourselves and as God loves us.

You can know the health of a community by this relationality, this coming togetherness and building each other up; we see it in each other, in those who put themselves at the service of others, who build up our communities and hold us together. We know it in ourselves too, and we know when we need to step aside and take time away, at times of grief and loss, and of relational disruption. I am returning to ministry after a year out, a restorative year in which I have continued to develop my bookbinding skills, explored printmaking, become a visitor and patron of the arts and museums in London and elsewhere, been on retreats, explored loss and grief, and travelled from the North to South and East to West of the UK, a pilgrim to sacred places, thin places, and places of outstanding natural beauty and wonder.

There is so much to share with you and for us to explore together. I could say more about having been Superintendent in the Islington and Camden Mission Circuit and before that in the Cardiff Circuit, or about the importance of our being listening and story-telling communities, of church at the margin, of intentionality and spirituality, ecumenism and relationships across faiths, but I will save that for when we are together. Stephanie and I are looking

forward to being with you in September, and meanwhile we continue to encounter people, places, creativity and life in the Southwest of Wales and England.

May God be with you all, and may you know God's power working in you, so that you can do infinitely more than you can ever ask or imagine, for the glory of God is revealed in our being fully alive.

Bridge Renewal

When the Annex was built in 1958 it was connected to our main building by an open-air steel and cast-iron bridge with railings on each side. In the late 1960s this was enclosed on a DIY basis by Church members.

Sixty years later that enclosure had reached the end of its useful life. The asbestos roof leaked (despite repeated patching), the window frames were rotting and there had never been any insulation. Church Council agreed on complete renewal of the superstructure.

So, in June/July, the old enclosure and original railings were stripped away and there was careful inspection of the underlying steel beams. In one small area, where rain had penetrated and not drained away, there was minor corrosion on the top of one beam. Both our builder and the structural surveyor we used commented independently that this should not be a problem but if we wanted to be doubly safe a short steel plate could be attached, and we opted for that.

A new, fully-insulated superstructure was then built on top, with bigger windows and uPVC cladding on the exterior walls. The result is a much lighter, less claustrophobic and rainproof passageway.

The project came in very largely on budget and on time - save only for the cost of and slight delay for the extra steel plate. And it was all achieved with only minimal disruption to the various groups using our upstairs rooms - thanks to our Administrator's careful rescheduling of bookings.

Open the Book

Andrew Parker, Peter Hunt (both from Chessington Methodist Church) and myself, on most Thursday mornings during school term time, go into St Andrew's and St Mark's Church of England Junior School in Maple Road and put on short plays relating to well-known Biblical events. The scheme is known as Open the Book. The scripts are contained in a book published by the Bible Society called *The Storytelling Bible*. There are 90 stories to choose from, ranging from the Creation in Genesis to the Book of Revelation at the end of the New Testament. The plays are acted out before the whole of the school assembly, lasting about 15-20 minutes, and if all the classes are present, over 300 pupils will be there.

So how did it start?

About seven years ago, Sharon Lloyd, then the youth work leader at Surbiton Hill, formed a small group from various churches in the area and, at the request of the school, began to perform. When Sharon left to take up a new job, Bron Coveney took over the leadership and on her departure last year it left the three of us to carry on. Personnel have changed over time. Marion Thorpe was part of the group over a lengthy period, but Andrew, Peter and I have been part of it since the early days.

From the very beginning, we would decide on the appropriate script after the school had given us the themes they wished us to develop, eg. faith or trust. We arranged who would play various parts with, over a period of time, more and more children getting involved and, as their confidence grew, to include speaking parts. However, when Bron left, a change in style, though not in substance, took place. Now the school decides both the theme and the script, leaving the direction and casting to us. We have always needed a narrator, who is often now a teacher. Despite some initial misgivings, the formula has worked surprisingly well, although it has been truly impossible to replace Bron. As well as being a fine director, she was a skilled magician, being a member of the Magic Circle. The props she provided were sometimes stunning!

We hope what we do may kindle the imagination of the children to explore the Bible more fully for themselves and, at the same time, get as much fun and enjoyment out of Open the Book as we do.

P.S. Since Bron and Marion gave up, we have been without a female actor. If anyone is interested in joining us, please contact me on **020 8399 8596**. We are all enthusiastic amateurs, so no acting experience is required, but the usual DBS safeguarding checks are needed,

Cricket

200 years ago, on 5 September 1826, John Wisden, British cricketer was born. He was the founder of *Wisden's Cricketers' Almanack* launched with 112 pages in 1864 and now runs to 1500 pages and is the bible of cricket.

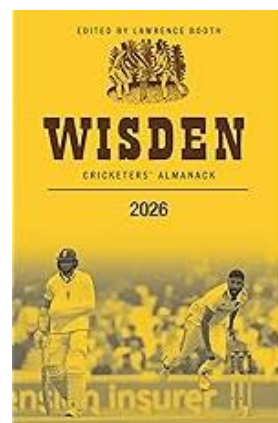
Wisden was a builder's son, born in Brighton. He moved to London after his father died, and lived with the outstanding Sussex wicketkeeper, Tom Box. Wisden was only 5ft 4in and weighed seven stone when he made his first-class debut for Sussex against MCC in 1845, taking nine wickets. He became known as Little Wonder.

He averaged 225 wickets a season for twelve years, took 455 wickets in 1851, and clean bowled all ten wickets in the second innings for North v South in 1850. He bowled fast, round-arm (before overarm was permitted) and was said to have had an extraordinary off-break. He was also a strong batsman.

Away from the game, Wisden began a cricket equipment business in Leamington Spa in 1850, and five years later opened a "cricket and cigar" shop in central London, initially in partnership with fellow-cricketer Fred Lillywhite. Wisden was also cricket coach at Harrow School and in 1867 bought The Cricketers, a public house at Duncton in Sussex.

In 1859 Wisden – by now bowling slow – was involved in the first tour by an English team to Canada and the United States, where he achieved a double hat-trick, taking six wickets in six balls.

Because of rheumatism, Wisden retired from cricket in 1863 at the early age of 37 and started publishing his annual *Cricketers' Almanack* the following year. Described now as the most famous sports book in the world, the iconic, yellow-bound volume contains comprehensive match records, chapter and verse, prophecy, history and the occasional sermon. It is known simply as Wisden.



Where are they now?

My favourite plants are tomatoes 🍅 Thursday is choir night and we are singing Rutter's Magnificat this term (I'm sure Linda will approve). I will be missing the performance though as I am cruising (which I'm sure Linda will not approve of).



I attend Bolsover Methodist Church. It has about 70 members and is one of the larger churches in the circuit; there are 15 churches in the circuit but we are reviewing our structure at the moment. Bolsover is a fairly relaxed church. It

has a heart for hospitality and we run a twice weekly cafe. We meet at 10.30am on a Sunday. We have a worship group so have a mix of contemporary songs and more traditional hymns. We have a few babies/toddlers which are a joy. We have had a few people join us from the new housing developments. I sing in the worship group, help run the craft group/natter session and do the occasional flower arrangement. It has the same issues as most churches - having enough volunteers and money to do all the things we want to.

This year we are celebrating 200 years of Methodism in Bolsover and have a few celebration events,

including a Songs of Praise. I have chosen 'Morning has broken' because we have a lot of noisy blackbirds in our garden! The hymn speaks to me about how God's blessings are new every morning and are enough to get us through each day.

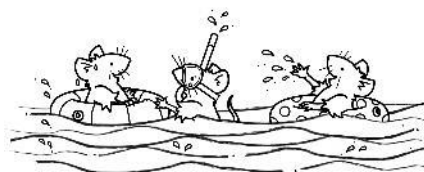
